# **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

The Bachelor of Science degree in Community Health Promotion provides students with the knowledge and skills to work in health-related, community-based programs. Some graduates continue their education, earning degrees such as a Master of Public Health.

The focus of the degree is to prepare health professionals who will work in communities to assess needs, plan and implement programs, conduct research, communicate health information, and serve as a health resource person. Courses are designed with hands-on learning in mind. Students participate in projects where they are meeting a real community's health needs.

Community Health Promotion also offers a minor for students who want to enhance their skills.

## **EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

Program graduates work to promote positive health behaviors and prevent disease by collaborating with individuals and communities. Employment opportunities are available in non-profit, government, healthcare, and business sectors. Some graduates also earn for the Certified Health Education Specialist credential from the National Commission on Health Education Credentialing. A number of program graduates have earned this additional certification.
