Eligible students are also encouraged to intern in Washington, D.C. with the Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars. The Political Science curriculum is designed to provide an understanding of the political process in its many manifestations, including the structure of government institutions, the political behavior of individuals and groups, the study of public problems characteristic of modern societies, and a consideration of the interrelationships of institutions at different levels of government.

EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES


