TEACHING ENGLISH TO SPEAKERS OF OTHER LANGUAGES (TESOL) MINOR

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

English is the language of business, diplomacy and science in many parts of the world, and there is a need for those prepared to teach it to speakers of other languages. Completion of this minor will empower students to understand the communication challenges of second-language learners and equip them with best practices and experience in teaching this population. Combining TESOL classes with General Studies classes such as HIST 2211, HIST 2212 and HIST 2213 and ENGL 2220 and ENGL 2221 opens students to a wide knowledge of world culture.

The TESOL minor does not yet carry certification for teaching English as a Second Language in public schools. But, with the minor, elementary and secondary teaching candidates often have added value for school districts with non-English speaking populations.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

There are opportunities for TESOL minors to put their skills to work domestically and abroad. After mastering the required curriculum and deciding what they want to teach, who they want to teach and compiling their additional qualifications, TESOL minors may decide to pursue jobs like:

- Linguistics and English lecturer
- Overseas English instructor
- Researcher
- Testing specialist
