The NSI and Political Science programs continue to grow in both the number of students and faculty. The new restructuring reflects the needs of the program and our students as well as maximize the expertise of the faculty. The assessment data regarding the restructuring was derived from three main sources. First, the NSI and Political Science programs administer exit surveys in our Capstone courses. Second, the NSI and Political Science programs both have restricted active Advisory Boards comprised of current professionals in the respective fields. Listly, the advanced upper level courses have all been taught at least once at Fairmont State University and the course evaluations have been universally positive in terms of content, relevance, and structure. We examined the data derived from our sources above as well as our constant internal analysis of what our program needs to provide to our students in order to put them in the best position to succeed in the field. This is an engoing process as demonstrated by our relatively brief but very successful history.

National Security and Intelligence (NSI) MAJOR. This proposal primarily restructures the NSI course requirements in order to incorporate more advanced curriculum (i.e. upper level courses) whilst also partially relieving the bottleneck of too many specific required courses. The amount of hours required remains the same and some of the required courses are now electives. The following courses are now required for the NSI degree: CRIM 2295; PHIL 3325; POLINSIS/CRIM 4440; GEOG 2213; GEOG 3316; and GEOG 3399. The following courses are no longer required for the NSI degree: BISM 4300; BSBA 2200; CRIM 3370; HIST 1107; HIST 1108; HIST 2213; HIST 3310; POLI 4405; and CRIM 4405.
