Bill of Rights

- The right to be treated as an individual.
- The right to be fully informed about the recruitment process.
- The right to ask questions and receive true and objective answers.
- The right to be treated with respect.
- The right to be treated as a capable and mature person without being patronized.
- The right to ask how and why and receive straight answers.
- The right to have and express opinions.
- The right to make informed choices without undue pressure from others.
- The right to be fully informed about the binding agreements implicit in the Women's PanHellenic Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement.
- The right to make one's own choice and decision and accept full responsibility for the results of that decisions.
- The right to have a positive, safe, and enriching recruitment and initiation experience.

Philanthropy And Service

Throughout the year, Greeks dedicate their time to their own local/national philanthropy , (ex: Breast Cancer Awareness) to help improve the greater community and to make a difference.

Recruitment Rules

1. A potential new member (PNM) must be enrolled as a full-time student with a minimum of 12 hours, and should they join Greek Life, they must maintain full-time student status.
2. No active member or alumni may purchase or give any PNM anything at any time during recruitment and no PNM may buy or take anything from an active member or alumni.
3. There will be no promising of bids directly or indirectly by any active member(s) or alumni.
4. Active members and/or alumni are not permitted to invite or take PNM to parties or events during the week of recruitment.
5. The use of alcohol or illegal drugs are strictly prohibited during Recruitment regardless of age.
6. Silence is established so that each PNM may decide for herself which sorority she wishes to join. No active members and PNM may communicate outside of Formal Recruitment events (Sororities only).
8. The strict silence period will begin following a chapter's last Preference Party at the conclusion of formal bid acceptance. Strict Silence is the period in which there will be no conversation or contact between sorority members and PNMs. This includes anything verbal, typed, or written (Sororities only).
9. A potential member must attend at least one recruitment party for each sorority.
10. Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA) will be filled out right after the last preference party. It is strongly discouraged on putting only one sorority name on MRABA (Sororities only).

Greek Vocabulary

Active

A member who has been initiated into fraternity or sorority.

Bid

A formal invitation to join a particular fraternity/ sorority.

Bid Party

A dry event at which you get to meet sorority members and interact with the chapter, while learning about the organization.

Big Brother/Sister

An active member of a fraternity or sorority who serves as a mentor to a new member, guiding them through their new member program and initiation.

Initiation

The formal ceremony that marks the beginning of active membership. Each chapter has a different set of requirements in order to be initiated.

Legacy

The brother or sister, son or daughter, or grandson or grand daughter of a fraternity or sorority member. Each local chapter has its own policy regarding legacies. Being a legacy does not mean automatic membership into that chapter.

Smoker

A formal event where potential members meet members of the fraternity and learn about the organization.

Philanthropy

A charitable fundraiser or service project sponsored by a fraternity or sorority. A dry event at which you get to meet sorority members and interact with the chapter, while learning about the organization.
